2009 PFFUI Convention Summary

The 33rd annual convention of the Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana was held in Evansville May 13-15, 2009 and it proved to be a productive and enjoyable gathering. Many thanks to Local President Paul Anslinger and the Brothers and Sisters of Evansville Local 357 for their generous hospitality.

A total of 120 delegates and 24 alternates representing 42 of our 62 Locals attended, with an additional 3 Locals represented by proxies. The PFFUI Executive Board, IAFF 8th District Vice-President and PFFUI President Emeritus Thomas Miller, Secretary-Treasurer Emeritus Richard Kissel, IAFF General President Harold Schaitberger, and numerous other guests participated for a well attended and successful convention.

A total of seven (7) resolutions were debated in committees and acted upon. No resolutions created an additional per capita increase at this convention. Resolutions acted upon are summarized as follows:

A resolution was adopted amending the Constitution and By-Laws removing the Trustees from the Executive Board as the new 5th and 6th District Vice-Presidents are added; however, maintaining four Trustees elected from regions mirroring the former four districts whose duties will remain as defined in auditing the financial records of the organization and further assisting the PFFUI Executive Board as directed by the President.

A resolution establishing an Emergency Assistance Loan Program was authorized. A specific policy regarding the program will be issued in the future after consultation with legal counsel.

A resolution amending language in the Constitution and By-Laws providing financial assistance to a Local for line of duty death funeral related expenses was also approved by delegates.

A resolution was adopted providing guidance to our representatives in seeking changes to the Indiana Medicaid Ambulance Reimbursement Rate structure.

A resolution was adopted requesting our representatives explore potential disability benefits for single role EMS members.

A resolution was approved providing guidance to our lobbyists reference potential legislation affecting our members' ability to hold elected offices.

Our successful year in the Indiana General Assembly was summarized by Vice-President James Ridley and detailed information is available on our web site at www.pffui.com.

In addition to the Executive Board Officers' reports, delegates also were informed of important issues in presentations from IAFF General President Harold Schaitberger, IAFF 8th District V.P. Tom Miller, IN DHS representative John Buckman, IAFF Financial Corporation representatives, and our esteemed State Legal Counsel Jack Ruckleshaus. A number of political allies from the Indiana General Assembly and other guests addressed the delegates on other important issues and concerns during the convention.

Firefighters' health and safety issues were also paramount in a number of presentations which can be summed up best by saying - Wear your SCBA! Masimo Rad-57 representatives discussed the need for assessing firefighters for CO poisoning at incidents. Greg Wyant, Noblesville FD, presented a report on firefighter exposures called 'What's in the air after the fire?'. Gary Coons, www.firefighterswithparkinsons.org, spoke of his life with the disease and the recognition of Parkinson's as a job related disease including the passage of legislation in this year's session recognizing it as such. Our former 4th District Vice-President Tim McDonnell, IFD, and now a representative with the Firefighter Cancer Support Network, echoed the issues of previous presenters and discussed his organization, more information on which is available at www.firefightercancersupport.org.

Nominations were conducted for Vice-Presidents in the newly established 5th and 6th Districts and both individuals were unopposed and were declared elected by acclamation.

5th District Vice-President: Anthony Murray of Hamilton County Local 4416

6th District Vice-President: Robert Loviscek of Bloomington Local 586

Floor actions authorized the 2011 convention be hosted by an alliance of Locals in the northwest Indiana counties. Those dates and the specific location will be announced when details are finalized. The 2010 convention will be held in Indianapolis.

President Hanify led an extended discussion regarding affiliate support of our PAC. His intention is to establish a PAC Development Committee as a 2-year task force empowered to review and update our promotional programs and materials, and to research means for growing support of the PAC across all the districts in the state. Encouragingly, a number of Locals indicated interest in growing the support in their locales while Hammond delegate Chris Trtan presented President Hanify with a check for \$5,505.00 and LaPorte delegate Bill Lott presented a check for \$450.00 for the PAC.

Delegates met Tyler Parson, Indiana's 2009 MDA Goodwill Ambassador and MDA representative Candace Thompson presented awards to various affiliates for their outstanding contributions collected in 'Fill The Boot' campaigns on behalf of MDA. Receiving recognition plaques for highest collections were Terre Haute Local 758 - \$17,944; Anderson Local 1262 - \$20,601; Evansville Local 357 - \$28,419; Lafayette Local 472 - \$37,617; and Fort Wayne Local 124 for collecting \$88,083. Receiving recognition plaques for highest per capita collections were Brazil Local 1453 - \$244.49; Auburn Local 2454 - \$311.28; Lafayette Local 472 - \$321.51; Clay Local 1630 - \$341.73; and Angola Local 3962 at \$849.88.

In recognition of their exemplary example of brotherhood, 3rd District Trustee Larry Zuber, Local 357 President Paul Anslinger, and Local 357 member Jeff Crowe presented an appreciation award to Jeffersonville Local 558 and their President Eric Hedrick for assisting brother Crowe and his family while Crowe was being treated at the University of Louisville burn unit in November 2008.

Resolution # 1 – 2009

Re: EXECUTIVE BOARD & DISTRICT TRUSTEES

Whereas, Resolution #1 adopted at the 2008 PFFUI Convention amended the Constitution and By-Laws establishing new districts and defined an Executive Board consisting of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and Six (6) District Vice-Presidents; and

Whereas, The decision regarding the roles and responsibilities of District Trustees was deferred to be considered as *the first order of business* at this year's convention in order to conduct elections of new Trustees, if necessary;

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana implement the following changes effective upon the adoption of this resolution:

- Trustees will not be members of the Executive Board.
- There will be four (4) Regional Trustees elected by region according to the attached map.
- The regions parallel the former four (4) district boundaries.
- They will continue to be elected as they are now in even numbered years for two year terms.
- The Constitution and By-Laws Article VI, Duties of Officers, Section 5, Trustees shall be amended to delete the second paragraph and read as follows:

The District Trustees shall audit the financial records of the Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana at least once per year and at such other times the President or the Executive Board deems desirable including upon any change in the individual Secretary-Treasurer. The District Trustees shall make a report of their findings on examination of the books to the Executive Board and to the Delegates at each Convention.

~~The District Trustees shall serve as the Registration / Credentials Committee at annual conventions of the organization. Trustees shall further assist the District Vice Presidents as necessary in service to the Locals in their Districts and as authorized by the President.~~

The Trustees may further assist the Executive Board as authorized by the President in meeting the organizing, educational, lobbying, or other service needs of the organization and the membership.

Resolution # 2 – 2009

Re: FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO LOCALS

Whereas, Affiliates may find their organizations in need of temporary financial assistance for a variety of unanticipated reasons in these difficult economic times; and

Whereas, Although the IAFF's Emergency Disputes Fund (EDF) program exists for similar purposes, it has been utilized to such a great extent that it's resources are extremely strained; and

Whereas, Although the PFFUI has long had a simple policy mirroring the IAFF's Emergency Disputes Fund (EDF) Policy, but lacked the financial means to actually fund such a program; and

Whereas, The PFFUI has now accumulated a reasonable sum of discretionary funds to potentially set aside for such a program;

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the PFFUI establish a Emergency Assistance Program and Fund by initially setting aside \$150,000.00 in a fund for the program;

And Be It Further Resolved, That the PFFUI adopt a written formal policy, in consultation with legal counsel, detailing the criteria for qualification, application, and repayment of interest-free assistance loans;

And Be It Further Resolved, That the policy adopted include the following general guidelines:

The Emergency Assistance Fund is established to aid and assist Locals who have experienced unusual problems that could not have been anticipated. A loan request can be initiated for a situation in which all reasonable efforts have been exhausted to solve a serious problem and an impasse has been reached. Whether a particular situation does or does not qualify for an interest-free loan will be decided on a case-by-case basis, depending on all circumstances.

Affiliates must show that they have a tendency to make substantial efforts to take care of their own problems and have had the foresight to establish a dues structure that will allow them to take care of usual and expected expenditures.

In no case shall assistance be provided to fund labor relations matters that are routinely encountered by affiliates, including contract negotiations prior to impasse, and grievances or arbitrations on disciplinary matters not involving union-related retaliation. Nor shall affiliates be eligible for loans to support their general operations or for political purposes, such as support of political referenda or ballot initiatives, except those referenda or initiatives that, if enacted, would result in significant loss of jobs and/or companies and stations.

The PFFUI Executive Board will review applications for emergency assistance and recommend the amount of assistance, if any, to be granted to an affiliate, subject to the majority vote of the Executive Board. Assistance will be in the form of interest-free loans, subject to a limit of a \$10,000 loan.

All interest-free loans will have a repayment schedule of five years or less; however, the repayment schedule may be extended by unanimous approval of the PFFUI Executive Board.

The Local shall make their loan request in written form to the President of the PFFUI stating the amount of the request, the reason for request, and a statement that the request has been authorized by the members of the Local Union. The letter must be signed by both the President and the Treasurer of the Local Union.

Requests for financial assistance will be subject to examination by the President, or his designee, of all pertinent financial records necessary in reaching a recommendation for approval or for disapproval. Any recommendation of the examiner(s) will be presented at an PFFUI Executive Board meeting.

Pertinent financial records shall include, but are not limited to the following:

Amount requested and detailed reasoning for the request.

Copy of bill(s) or written estimate of anticipated expenses to be incurred.

Copy of the last Local Union Audit.

Current and previous year's Financial Records including Balance Sheets and Profit /Loss Statements.

Current Membership and Dues Structure.

Copy of Minutes from meetings relevant to issue and detailing membership's action on motions relevant to issue and their approval to seek financial assistance.

The Officers of the Local making the request may be required to appear before the PFFUI Executive Board to answer any questions on the aforementioned items.

If the request for financial assistance is granted, the Local Union must abide by the rules and restrictions mandated by the PFFUI Executive Board.

The requesting Local Union will be required to sign a statement of understanding of those rules and restrictions.

The two (2) principal officers of the requesting Local Union shall sign a promissory note, if applicable, before any assistance check may be issued. Failure to follow the terms, rules, or restrictions agreed to by the Local Union will allow the Executive Board of the PFFUI to recall the unpaid amounts of the assistance immediately.

Resolution # 3 - 2009

Re: LINE OF DUTY DEATH ASSISTANCE

Whereas, The tragic unexpected loss of a brother or sister to a line of duty death may result in an immediate financial hardship to a Local affiliate as they assist with the planning and logistics of a line of duty funeral; and

Whereas, The PFFUI's policy regarding assistance is outdated and needs revision;

Therefore Be It Resolved, Article VIII, Section 7 of the PFFUI Constitution and By-Laws be amended by deletion and rewriting as follows:

~~The Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana shall, if requested by an affected Local, pay line of duty death funeral related expenses incurred by a Local up to \$4,000.00 per incident. The funds will be raised by special assessment of up to \$1.00 per active member per Local Union of the P.F.F.U.I., except members of the Local who incurs the line of duty death. Any additional monies necessary, if the assessment collected does not equal the expenses incurred of \$4,000.00, shall be paid from the emergency account. Line of duty death is that which is defined by Indiana statute or by federal public safety officer benefit.~~

The Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana shall, if requested by an affected Local Affiliate, **provide financial assistance to the affiliate for line of duty death funeral related expenditures in an amount equal to \$1.00 per active member on the total current active membership of the PFFUI.** The funds will be raised by special assessment of up to \$1.00 per active member per Local Union of the PFFUI, except members of the Local who incurs the line of duty death. Line of duty death is that which is defined by Indiana statute or by federal public safety officer benefit.

Resolution # 4 - 2009

Re: INDIANA MEDICAID AMBULANCE REIMBURSEMENT RATES

Whereas, Many PFFUI affiliates provide EMS transport units, and bill for those services; and

Whereas, Many of those same affiliates are under tremendous strain financially due to the poor economy and the effects of HEA 1001; and

Whereas, Indiana Medicaid reimbursement rates do not cover the cost of the transport itself, resulting in a loss of property tax dollars every time a Medicaid patient is transported; and

Whereas, Indiana Medicaid has effectively provided only a 10% raise in rates since 1976, and the inflation rate from 1976 to 2008 was 278%; and

Whereas, In 2001, Indiana Medicaid discontinued their Medicare co-payments; and

Whereas, Medicare provides reimbursement for six (6) levels of ambulance transportation, Indiana Medicaid recognizes only three (3); and

Whereas, Indiana Medicaid reimbursement rates are below average when compared to all 50 states Medicaid reimbursement rates; and

Whereas, Indiana, in some instances, has placed ambulance transportation under Risk Based Management Programs with the knowledge that unlike other medical providers, EMS providers do not have a choice in what patients they choose to service;

Therefore Be It Resolved, That representatives of the PFFUI lobby the appropriate state agencies, and pursue legislation if necessary, to enact the following changes in the Indiana Medicaid Ambulance Reimbursement Rates:

- Indiana Medicaid should recognize all six (6) levels of service recognized by Medicare.
- Indiana Medicaid should reimburse all levels of service at 110% of Medicare Reimbursement.
- Indiana Medicaid should institute an annual increase in ambulance reimbursement rates that corresponds with the national CPI, or matches Medicare rate increases.
- Ambulance transportation should be removed from Risk Based Management programs and placed entirely under traditional Medicaid programs.

Resolution # 5 – 2009 as Amended

Re: SINGLE ROLE EMS MEMBER’S DISABILITY BENEFITS

Whereas, EMS members, not covered by the 1977 Police and Firefighters Fund, are inadequately provided for in the case of a disability; and

Whereas, A committee, appointed by the President of the PFFUI to discuss issues of importance to members of the PFFUI engaged in EMS, met earlier this year and has provided the following recommendation on this subject;

Therefore Be It Resolved, That representatives of the PFFUI research the feasibility of potential legislation to provide coverage for single role EMS members under one of the following two options:

- Provide for eligibility and coverage of single role city, town, township, or county EMS members under PERF; or
- Create a new and separate disability fund for single role city, town, township, or county EMS members that provides coverage with similar benefit percentages currently available to firefighters in the 1977 Fund and including provisions for similar presumptive benefits;

Resolution # 6 - 2009

Re: FIREFIGHTERS AND ELECTED POSITIONS

Whereas, Legislation was pursued in this year's legislative session seeking to eliminate the ability of firefighters and police officers to hold elected positions; and

Whereas, This legislation is likely to be re-introduced next year and although our opposition to such restrictions remains steadfast, support for such legislation continues to grow and our lobbyists need direction to pursue reasonable compromises through potential amendments if the legislation advances;

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the representatives of the PFFUI shall remain strongly opposed to legislation singling out public safety officers as ineligible to hold locally elected offices;

And Be It Further Resolved, If such legislation is introduced again, that the representatives of the PFFUI are authorized to seek introduction of legislation with reasonable compromises enabling the basic right to elected office to continue. Such reasonable compromises may include filing conflict of interest disclosures, voting limitations on salary ordinances or collective bargaining agreements in which a member may benefit, and ineligibility for office for members holding politically appointed upper level policy making positions.

Resolution # 7 – 2009 as Amended

Re: INDIANA CERTIFICATION OF PARAMEDICS VS. NATIONAL REGISTRY

Whereas, The state of Indiana currently certifies paramedics; and

Whereas, There has been talk from the state of requiring all Indiana paramedics to become nationally registered; and

Whereas, The process for an already Indiana certified paramedic to become a nationally registered paramedic is:

If the candidate's initial EMT-Paramedic educational program was completed more than two (2) years ago and the candidate has maintained state certification at the EMT-Paramedic level, the candidate must submit documentation verifying completion of a current EMT-Paramedic refresher-training program within the past two (2) years.

Successful completion of the NREMT-Paramedic cognitive and psychomotor examinations.

Whereas, The average cost of a paramedic refresher-training program is \$325, and the application fee for the national registry is an additional \$110, with the application fee due in full each time if a re-test is required; and

Whereas, The above required paramedic refresher-training program is a required 48-hour minimum, or four days in length; and

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the PFFUI values any and all certifications and education that further patient care and its' members careers;

And Be It Further Resolved, That the PFFUI take the position that requiring all levels of EMS certifications to become nationally registered by the state of Indiana would put an undue hardship financially, through actual fees and time lost on the job, to either individual members or their departments;

And Be It Further Resolved, That the PFFUI opposes any mandation of EMS certifications be obtained and maintained through NREMT's.
